Week 1: Why a Series on This Subject? History of Governance

Day 1: Introduction to Government's Role

- Scripture: Romans 13:1 "Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God."
- Reflection: In a world often divided by politics and governance, it is essential to revisit
 the biblical perspective on the role of government. The apostle Paul reminds us in
 Romans 13 that all governing authorities are established by God. This passage
 encourages us to respect and be subject to our leaders as a form of obedience to God.
 However, this respect has its limits, especially when human laws contradict God's
 commands. The essence of this scripture is not blind allegiance but recognition of God's
 sovereignty over all human institutions. Our primary allegiance is to God, and through
 this lens, we must evaluate our relationship with earthly authorities.
- Application: Consider how you react to government decisions that affect you. Do you respond with prayer and discernment, or with frustration and anger? This week, make it a point to pray for your Elected leaders and ask God to guide their decisions. Reflect on how you can be an example of respectful and prayerful citizenship in your community.

Day 2: Biblical Examples of Governance

- Scripture: Daniel 6:26 "I issue a decree that in every part of my kingdom people must fear and reverence the God of Daniel."
- Reflection: Throughout the Bible, we find various examples of governance, from the judges in Israel to the kings and emperors who ruled vast territories. The story of Daniel in the lion's den shows how God can work through both faithful individuals and secular rulers to accomplish His purposes. King Darius's decree to honor the God of Daniel demonstrates how even pagan rulers can be used by God to uphold His sovereignty and truth. This example challenges us to see God's hand in unlikely places and to recognize His ultimate authority over all rulers.
- Application: Identify ways you can be like Daniel, living out your faith boldly in the public square. How can your actions and words influence others, including those in authority, to recognize the sovereignty of God? Commit to being a faithful witness in your workplace, community, or wherever you have influence.

Day 3: The Purpose of Government in Society

- Scripture: 1 Timothy 2:1-2 "I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people— for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness."
- Reflection: One of the purposes of government, as outlined in Scripture, is to create an environment where peace and order prevail, allowing believers to live lives marked by godliness and holiness. Paul's instruction to Timothy emphasizes the importance of prayer for those in leadership positions. Our prayers should focus on asking God to grant

wisdom and justice to our leaders, so that society as a whole can benefit from stability and fairness.

• Application: Set aside time each day this week to pray specifically for your local, national, and world leaders. Pray that they would seek justice, wisdom, and peace in their decisions. Reflect on how your own actions and attitudes can contribute to the peace and order of your community.

Day 4: The Fallibility of Human Leaders

- Scripture: Psalm 146:3 "Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save."
- Reflection: Human leaders, no matter how well-intentioned, are flawed and limited in their ability to bring about lasting change or salvation. The Psalmist reminds us that our ultimate trust and hope must be in God alone. While we are called to respect and pray for our leaders, we must also recognize their limitations and the danger of placing them on a pedestal. This perspective helps us maintain a balanced view of political and social structures and prevents us from becoming disillusioned when leaders fail.
- Application: Reflect on areas where you may have placed too much trust in human institutions or leaders. Ask God to help you redirect your trust and hope back to Him. Consider how you can encourage others to find their security and peace in God rather than in worldly systems.

Day 5: Historical Missteps in Governance

- Scripture: 1 Samuel 8:19-20 "But the people refused to listen to Samuel. 'No!' they said. 'We want a king over us. Then we will be like all the other nations, with a king to lead us and to go out before us and fight our battles.'"
- Reflection: The Israelites' insistence on having a human king, despite God's warnings through Samuel, illustrates a common misstep in governance: the desire to conform to worldly standards rather than God's design. This decision led to a long history of both good and bad kings, showing the mixed results of human leadership. It serves as a warning to us not to seek security or identity in any form of human governance but to remain faithful to God's guidance and commands.
- Application: Reflect on times when you have sought solutions in human systems instead of turning to God. How can you seek God's direction and wisdom in your involvement with governance and politics? Ask God to help you prioritize His kingdom and values above all else.

Day 6: Lessons from the Prophets

- Scripture: Isaiah 10:1-2 "Woe to those who make unjust laws, to those who issue oppressive decrees."
- Reflection: The prophets of the Old Testament were not only messengers of God's will but also vocal critics of unjust systems and leaders. Isaiah, Jeremiah, Amos, and others called out the social and political injustices of their times, urging rulers and the people to repent and return to God's ways. Their boldness and clarity provide us with a model for

engaging with our own political and social systems. We are called to speak out against injustice, advocate for the oppressed, and hold leaders accountable to God's standards of righteousness.

 Application: Identify an issue of injustice in your community or nation. Pray for wisdom and courage to speak out and take action in a way that honors God and reflects His love for justice. Consider partnering with others who are working towards godly solutions to social and political problems.

Day 7: The Kingdom of God vs. Earthly Kingdoms

- Scripture: John 18:36 "Jesus said, 'My kingdom is not of this world. If it were, my servants would fight to prevent my arrest by the Jewish leaders. But now my kingdom is from another place.'"
- Reflection: Jesus' statement before Pilate underscores the fundamental difference between His kingdom and the kingdoms of this world. Earthly kingdoms are often characterized by power struggles, conflicts, and the pursuit of self-interest. In contrast, the Kingdom of God is marked by peace, righteousness, and selfless love. As citizens of God's kingdom, we are called to live by a different set of values and priorities. This means that our ultimate allegiance is to God and His kingdom, not to any earthly nation or leader.
- Application: Consider how you can live as a citizen of God's kingdom in your daily life. How do your values, priorities, and actions reflect the teachings and example of Jesus? Commit to being a faithful representative of God's kingdom in your interactions with others, especially in the realm of politics and governance.

Week 2: Choosing Your Compass - Political Ideology & Idolatry

Day 8: Aligning Our Hearts with God's Will

- Scripture: Matthew 6:33 "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."
- Reflection: In a world where political loyalties and ideologies can be divisive, it is essential for believers to remember that our primary loyalty must always be to God and His kingdom. When we prioritize God's will and His righteousness, everything else in our lives, including our political views and actions, will align accordingly. Our focus should be on seeking God's direction in every aspect of our lives, allowing His truth to guide us rather than being swayed by the shifting winds of political trends.
- Application: Spend time in prayer today, asking God to reveal areas of your life where you may be prioritizing worldly ideologies over His kingdom. Reflect on how you can actively seek God's will in your political views and actions. Consider practical steps you can take to ensure that your decisions are aligned with God's truth.

Day 9: The Danger of Idolatry in Politics

• Scripture: Exodus 20:3 — "You shall have no other gods before me."

- Reflection: Idolatry can take many forms, including the elevation of political leaders or ideologies to a place of ultimate importance in our lives. When we place our trust and hope in political figures or systems, we are in danger of replacing God with an idol. This misplaced allegiance can lead us to compromise our values, ignore injustice, or even justify unethical behavior. - Application: Reflect on your political engagement and consider whether you have allowed any person, party, or ideology to become an idol in your life. Ask God to help you keep Him at the center of your heart and mind. Day 10: Finding Our Identity in Christ, Not Politics

- Scripture: Galatians 3:28 "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."
